Thether they're runners, walkers, or dog lovers all participants in the Chamber's 23rd Farragut Fall 5K & Fun Walk will love the closed road course and other treats in store for them during the event! Runners enjoy the scenery of Sedgefield Subdivision, and runners/walkers can take in the peaceful paths of Mayor Bob Leonard Park. Registrations are still open online!

Participants of all skill levels are invited to join the Chamber on Veterans Day, Nov. 11 at Mayor Bob Leonard Park on Watt Road (closed from 7:30 a.m. until about 9:00 a.m.) for a fun fast-paced event. Pre-registered check-in and on-site registration is from

7-7:30 a.m. The race and walk both begin at 8:00 a.m.

Teams of four are highly encouraged and not only because they get a discount! Each team member chooses between the run, walk or sleep-in. Walkers may also bring their dogs and can opt to join a canine trainer led Pack Walk this year! Teams are a great way to include family or colleague team-building. All registrations include a long-sleeved shirt and goody bag (while supplies last). The USATF sanctioned event is administered by Total Race Solutions.

The race and 1-mile walk begin on Watt Road near Kingston Pike. Runners and walkers travel up Watt Road with runners heading north through Sedgefield Subdivision, highlighted by First Utility District's hydration station. Walkers/pets head into the park where both groups finish.

Breakfast Panel Address Cyber Concerns

An audience of 80 braved the rain on Tuesday, Nov. 7 to hear a highly informative discussion presented at Fox Den Country Club, made possible by Presenting Sponsors First Utility District and Town of Farragut as part of the Chamber's Breakfast Speaker Series. The panel--made up of FBI Special Agent Dan Damron, Bill Dean-Senior Manager of Information Security Services for LBMC, Joe Littleton-EdSouth/SouthEast Bank IT Manager, Mark McKinney-First Utility District Head of Capital Infrastructure and moderator Chuck Nelson-Lead Cyber Defense program instructor at Pellissippi State Community College—spoke at length on topics concerning current threats to individuals/businesses plus tips on cyber defense practices.

As moderator, Nelson guided the panel through questions to spark commentary from their specialized industry perspectives spanning from federal to financial, business support to major utilities. Nelson commented that in the realm of cyber-crime, "There are mostly two types of businesses: those who've been hacked and those who don't know they've been hacked." Guests were surprised to learn that infiltrators to a company's network can gather information for upwards of 200 days before any software alerts them to a possible hack.

Littleton and others agreed one of the biggest threats is business email compromise; that it is "no longer some kid in his basement" perpetrating cyber-attacks but organizations funded by foreign entities like



Russia, North Korea and Nigeria. McKinney and Dean each gave examples of how communication can start with a simple spoofed email from what looks like a known vendor, and that the attempt to steal funds won't take place until months after a relationship has been built. McKinney was encouraged by seeing more employees at every level checking with IT to ensure an email is safe to open. "It's a huge step forward for our industry," he said.


Ransomware was another topic of interest; the panel agreed that while paying money to get back data or personal photos/files only enables criminals, they understand those who do so. Special Agent Damron said that if someone is attacked and pays the ransom, "Call us and tell us; we won't come arrest you for paying to get your information back." He continued, echoed by the panel, that "It would be a poor business model for ransomware attackers to not give your data back; there is almost an honor amongst thieves." Dean recommended ensuring you have current backups of data so you do not have to pay and "Don't store backups on a device that stays connected to your computer; people with good intentions do it all the time."

Though a number of issues were covered in 45 minutes, audience members engaged actively in Q&A. While some questions targeted specific software protections, others addressed broader concerns like the sepa-


